The Nittai-ji Temple was established in 1904 and rebuilt in 1984 as a repository for a Thai-style golden image of Buddha and Buddhist relics present by the King Chulalongkorn of Siam in 1900. The Nittai-ji, which literally means the Japan-Thailand-Temple, is an international temple as its name implies and a symbol of the friendly relations between the two countries.



Climate in Nagoya

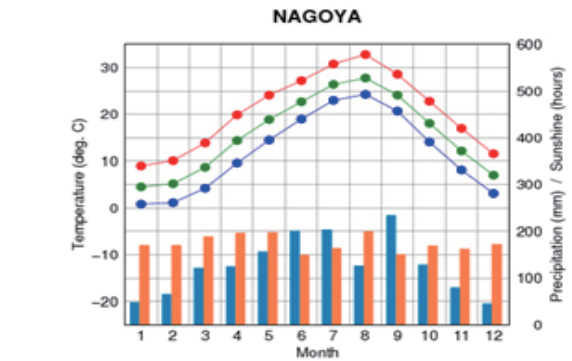
The four seasons of the year are quite distinct in Nagoya.

Spring (March to May)

The plum blossoms bloom in late February, signaling spring's arrival. The mild spring season brings out Japan's beautiful cherry blossoms, which are enjoyed from late March through April.

Summer (June to August)

Summer begins from June to July with a three to four week rainy season. This is followed by screaming cicadas and intense heat and humidity that peaks in August.

Autumn (September to November)

The transition into autumn is marked by typhoons and heavy rain. Weather cools pleasantly in October, and November is relatively dry and mild. Forests are dyed with red and golden leaves.

Winter (December to February)

Winter is cold, sunny, and dry, and the city experiences only a few days major of snowfall in January or February. Winter illuminations, decorated with LED lights, have become a popular attraction across the city.
